Hall of Fame

'Of all the cricketers known to me who, from one cause or another, achieved less than their true deserts, Roger Kimpton would top the list.' So wrote E.W. Jim' Swanton, who knew a few cricketers in his long career as a cricket writer.

Roger Kimpton came up to Brasenose in 1934 from Melbourne Grammar School in Australia. He played four years for Oxford from 1935-38 and, although there are others who made a greater weight of runs, it was Kimpton's style of batting which had people running to The Parks to watch him bat.

He was small in stature and a quick-footed, wristy player, who also kept wicket. In his second game for Oxford he scored 160 in 150 minutes against Gloucestershire, his last 50 coming in just 25 minutes, and followed this with 84 in quick time against Yorkshire.

He made good use of his first year by winning the Freshman Singles title at tennis and taught himself golf, in which he also won a Blue.

In his second year, in 1936 he scored two centuries in the first match of the season, again against Gloucestershire, and then a 70-minute hundred against Lancashire. He was injured for the Varsity match that year but played for Oxford and Worcestershire in the next two seasons.

In 1937 he scored 1,568 runs for Oxford and Worcestershire and played for the Gentlemen against the Players at Lord's, top-scoring with 59. In all he scored 2412 runs for Oxford over the four seasons.

Hall of Fame

At the end of the 1938 season Kimpton returned to Melbourne, and a role in the family flour-milling business W.S. Kimpton and Sons, but also learned to fly. The war then put a stop to any further cricketing ambitions.

On its outbreak, he joined the Royal Australian Air Force and flew 140 bombing missions in the Pacific War, commanding 75 Squadron and winning the Distinguished Flying Cross for 'outstanding courage on numerous operational sorties, and aggressive and determined leadership which proved an inspiration to the pilots under his command'.

With the war over, he returned to the family business as a partner, modernised and expanded it, becoming in the process one of Australia's leading businessmen. His cricket career was largely over but he came to England in 1949 and made one appearance for Worcestershire, making 93 in 80 minutes wearing borrowed gym shoes.

And John Arlott echoed Swanton when writing that Kimpton's name was always noted when conversation turns to 'the lost men of cricket who might have been among the great without the war'.
